COURSE DESCRIPTION

Each year as we approach the holiday season, society is confronted with legal and Constitutional issues on the demonstration and traditional holiday display of religious beliefs. For example, in the Christian community, the public display of the Nativity Scene has come under criticism and Constitutional challenge under the charge of separation of church and state. Of course, public Christian traditional holiday displays are not the only communities that have been challenged.

In this course we examine and analyze the diverse religious beliefs of our nation, and their manifestations during the holiday season. We also will examine and begin to understand how the Constitution of the United States defends individual and societal freedoms granted under the Bill of Rights and how law is applied in the public manifestation of these beliefs throughout the holiday season and beyond.
